Following one of our One Church One Book discussion groups, an individual came up to me and said, “I don't know if I can do this.” Caught off guard by a statement I interpreted to mean “I don't plan to participate in any more of these discussion groups,” I took a deep breath and calmly asked, “Could you say a bit more about what you mean?” Unknowingly, in that question, a doorway was opened to a powerful and deeply holy conversation.

In awe I listened as this individual succinctly and articulately spoke of the transformation God was calling her to. She spoke of how all her life she had lived as a child of God. God was as real as the breath she breathed and the food she ate. There was no question about God or what it meant to be in relationship with God. Everything about her life had been about God. But in these most recent years, the thought began to dawn within her that maybe there was more to this God than she had ever known. Maybe there was a deeper, richer way God longed to be in relationship with her. Maybe her faith to this point in time had been in some ways a façade of religiosity. For what had come alive to her, and what she now struggled with, was the reality that God was calling her to be touched and transformed by the very truth Christ proclaimed and died for on the cross of Calvary.

Longing to know God with such honesty and purity, she spoke her pained truth, “I don't know if I can do it. I don't know if I can now turn my life that fully over to God.”

Without any doubt, these words were spoken by a person who had encountered the living God – a God who is not the nice, warm, cuddly, loving God of Sunday School, but the Lord of Jesus, who demands nothing less than everything of us. What this individual heard was God's calling to the cross: to

become someone who no longer simply listens to the words of Christ and does good deeds because of them, but who becomes in her own human body, his disciple. She knew that this moment was about nothing less than the death and resurrection of her life. She was one who stood like Jesus, praying in the garden of Gethsemane, and with trembling and trepidation was being invited to speak the words of life, “Not my will, but your will be done, my Lord and my God.”

This spiritual awakening to the living God is happening all across the church as people have begun to realize that there is something more to this faith than what Christendom had ever allowed for. Anthony B. Robinson writes, “The civic faith that was operative in many of our congregations for so many years was a compound of good citizenship, personal moral virtues, and doing what we could to make the world a better place. Of course, there’s nothing wrong with that; it’s just that there’s nothing specifically Christian about it” (p.61).

Today, as the intertwining of our culture and Christianity continues to unravel, there is a growing awareness that God is calling to us. Unlike the call of civic faith, God is not necessarily calling us to be good, moral citizens who do nice things within this world. Instead, the call is to discipleship, to follow in the way of our savior, to live our lives in service to God just as Jesus himself did. It is a call defined not by the culture in which we live, but is a call revealed through the prayerful reading of Scripture, mediated by the Spirit, and testified to in the lives of the saints and the martyrs of the church.

As a church, we are being called by God to our time of resurrection. We are being called to the time in which we trust that God will make all things new. We are being called to a time of the death of what has been, so that we can respond to what will be. Like Jesus, praying in the garden of Gethsemane, with trembling and trepidation, we are being invited to speak the words of life, “Not my will, but your will be done, my Lord and my God.”

CARING FOR RELATIONSHIPS

Filling our Time with what Matters Most

One of my clients recently came in and expressed his feelings of overwhelm. He felt overcommitted at work, stressed at home, and generally confused. He said that he didn't feel that there was any time left for him. I reminded him that to stay in balance, we can only give from the overflow. And I asked him: Would he be willing to try an experiment?

I asked him to imagine that he had in front of him a large jar, and some sand, water, pebbles and 3 big rocks. I told him that he had to fit everything into the jar, and then asked him, "what should you put in the jar first?" He thought for a moment and then said that he had to put the three big rocks in first, because he would never be able to fit them in if the other items went in first. Bingo!

If we don't take care of ourselves by making sure that our "big rocks"- the most important activities and uses of our time- are in the jar first, we certainly won't be able to take care of all the other people in our lives or the work that has to get done. And we probably will feel overwhelmed, resentful, stressed and/or confused. Some of the "big rocks" my clients talk about are:

- Listening to music
- Exercise
- Meditation
- Being in nature
- Reading
- Praying
- Writing in a journal
- Drawing/painting
- Getting enough sleep, etc.

Notice that these are actions that you do on your own. And that after doing them, the benefits that you receive include feeling more balanced, more "yourself."

What are your big rocks? What makes you feel good? What keeps you in balance? I encourage you to identify your three big rocks and practice them at least several times a week. Prioritization requires attention and discipline; when our activities reflect what's most important to us then we can generously give from the overflow.

CROP WALK 2011

What a beautiful day! This year there were a total of 92 walkers and 6 dogs, with \$3777 raised. Last year there were 88 walkers and 7 dogs and we raised \$3081.50 . There were 7 churches that participated this year while last year we had 6. St. Paul's Lutheran Douglassville will keep the Golden Sneaker and Walking Stick for most walkers and most donations. Thank you to all who walked and/or donated to the Crop Walk. ~Angie Kutz



We are a month into our Fuel the Furnace Campaign and thank you for your generous donations to this Campaign. Over the last month we have received nearly \$2,000 in gifts and a pledge of \$3,000 toward the campaign. Because of this assurance that you are fully behind this project, we are contracting to begin the project in November to limit the amount of fuel oil we would need to purchase this year.

Your support is still needed though to bring a completion to the project, which is now very much so in reach by the end of the year. If you haven't given to the campaign yet, please give "Fuel The Furnace" special consideration in your monthly giving. Truly this is an investment in our ministry.

In case you don't know about the Campaign, here are the particulars:

- As presented at the Special Congregational Meeting on Sunday, September 11th, it had been decided to move forward with converting our existing heating system, from oil to gas, to allow for a more efficient and cost effective system.
- We received many bids from contractors that ranged anywhere from \$39,000 to \$10,000. The main difference in the estimates was whether we kept the existing boiler and, of course, labor costs. We decided to contract with Berks Products, who will keep our existing boiler, install a new tankless water heater, and a new gas burner for \$10,000.
- After the conversion process is done, we will test the soil around the existing oil tank so we can follow DEP Regulations. If there are no complications and the tank has not leaked, we can decommission the tank for around \$4,000. (This work can happen any time after the conversion of the heating system)
- To account for any possible overages to the project, we have budgeted \$16,000 for the entire project. With \$6,000 already available in the Capital Improvement Fund we are well on our way to our goal. Gifts for this project can be deposited into the building envelopes found in the pews. Or just simply write "Fuel the Furnace" on a special envelope.

Dear Friends in Christ,

Boxes. Where would we be without them?! Whether it's containing our morning breakfast cereal or the holiday decorations up in the attic, boxes are one of the more practical items ever devised.

Despite how helpful boxes are, however, they're simply no good when it comes to **people**. The moment that a person gets put into a box—metaphorically speaking, of course—is the moment when trouble begins. People just don't belong in boxes!

And yet... Aren't these statements something we've heard or maybe even said within our church community at St. Paul's?

I don't do evangelism.

Missions? That's for somebody else.

I'm not a teacher, so I'm not teaching Sunday School.

Worship? That's for the pastor. He's the expert.

The flip side is that we've just put *someone else* in a box. What these statements imply is that if we're not part of a particular group or Ministry Team—and someone else is—that person is the one who's "supposed" to do that ministry.

Now it's perfectly true that we all have different gifts and passions and talents to use in God's service for the furtherance of Christ's kingdom here on earth. Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, 12: 5-6, talks about just this fact.

But do any of us belong in a box? No way! We are **all of us** called as disciples of Christ to do good works (missions), to share our faith (evangelize), to build one another up in the faith (teach), and to celebrate our God (worship). The Bible doesn't call us to be on a Ministry Team or a committee to do these things. We are called to live them out in our daily lives!

As we continue with Changing the Conversation, part of the discussion may be looking at how to move each other and our own selves *out of* ministry boxes. Is there another way of doing and being the church? Could there be a new way of ministry?

Let's be in prayer about this, and let's leave the boxes for the corn flakes and Christmas tree lights.

1941 CHURCH ADDITION *Redesigning for our ministry*

On November 5th, during the church wide workday we will be redesigning the way in which the 1941 addition of the church is currently organized. The goal is to create a more dynamic and multiple purpose facility out of the existing lounge, choir room, chime room, stage, and old pastor's office. Though the major part of the re-arranging will occur on November 5th, the final set up will not be completed till January as we learn and adjust to the new arrangement. As we live into this new space, please be in conversation with the leadership so that we might make wise and informed decisions about how we organize ourselves for ministry together.

THERE IS STILL TIME TO VOTE

In September, every member received a letter inviting you to help determine the 2012 ministry priorities of St. Paul's by completing a Faith Gift Intention Card. We have had a strong positive response to date, but we are still waiting for a number of individuals to provide their guidance. LANDMARK BAPTISMAL AGREEMENT

Multidenominational agreement

This summer, at the national Gathering of the United Church of Christ (General Synod 28), the UCC affirmed the *Common Agreement on Mutual Recognition of Baptism*. This agreement between the UCC, Presbyterian Church USA, Reformed Church in America, Christian Reformed Church, and the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops affirms that in Christ there is but one baptism which unites us all as members of his body, the church. Therefore, these churches, from this summer on, agree to mutually recognize each other's baptisms as sacramental acts originating from our Father in heaven.

Truly this is a great work worthy of significant rejoicing as we heal the human divisions we have inflicted upon the body of Christ that has kept fellow brothers and sisters in Christ from mutual recognition of God's blessings in each of our lives. Praise be to God for the courage of all those who surrendered much to serve our living God!

PSEC VOTES TO RATIFY SWEEPING CHANGES TO THE UCC CONSTITUTION

On November 19th, at St. Paul's UCC, Amityville, the Pennsylvania Southeast Conference of the UCC (our regional body that stretches from Philadelphia to Schuylkill County) will vote on a massive restructuring proposal for the United Church of Christ. As the world has changed, so has the role of the church and that of its national entities. The proposal is to unify the 5 national boards into one decision making body to streamline and better focus the purpose and ministries of the UCC. This change would reduce the number of individuals in direct leadership positions from 300 down to 52.
